#### COUNSELLOR'S CORNER WITH MISS SEREDA

We have been covering sexual health topics in health classes at Bruderheim School for students in grades 4-6 this month. I have included a parent guide for "Talking to Your Kids About Sexual Health" from <a href="www.teachingsexualhealth.ca">www.teachingsexualhealth.ca</a>. This is an excellent website for parents that includes resources, tips, information and parent guides.

Your child sees you as a role model and a valuable and credible source of information. They want to get health information from you based on the loving and trusting relationship you have. For these reasons, along with many others, it's important that

you talk about sexual health with your child—this will help your child to make healthy, informed decisions now and later on. Here are some tips for starting or having conversations about sexual health at any age:

- be an askable adult. Being an askable adult means that your child feels:
  - o comfortable coming to you
  - feels respected
  - feels heard

# An askable adult teaches their child through words, through behaviour and their reactions to situations and questions.

- start early and talk often. Don't try to cover everything at once, but also don't worry if you think you have said too much. If you haven't started the conversation with your child yet, don't worry. It's never too late to start.
- keep the language simple and age-appropriate. A 3 year old may be satisfied with "babies grow in a special place inside the mother's body called a uterus". A 6 year old may have more questions about how the baby grows, and may want to know how it will come out.
- use proper terms for body parts and body functions. It can confuse children when some body parts have cute names and not others. This can also help to protect your child from abuse, as they will have the words to tell you if they feel something happened.
- use teachable moments to begin the talk. Talk about and help them understand issues as they come up in TV shows, movies, ads, music, the news and in the community. This can also be a good time to talk about your values and beliefs.
- find out what they already know. Ask your child what they can tell you about a certain sexuality topic. Older children in school will hear comments or words that they don't understand. Asking them what they know can give you the chance to correct any wrong information.
- talk about more than the facts. Along with facts, talk about feelings, relationships and how they affect other people.

- give resources. Be sure there are resources in your home where your children can get the right information. Have age-appropriate resources (e.g., books) for them to get the answers they're looking for.
- don't act like you know it all. Be an active learner yourself. Your child will teach you just as much as you teach them.
- encourage your child to talk about what they think. This can help each of you talk about your values.
- let them know what's socially okay and not okay. As children get older, it's important to help them understand that other people's values may be different from theirs.
- when your child asks you a question, do your best to answer it at the time. If you don't know the answer, suggest that you find out together or tell them you'll find out and get back to them. Don't put it off—they might think that it's not okay to talk about it.
- listen carefully. When your child does come to you with questions, listen carefully and make sure you understand what they're asking

# **Grade 1 News**

Where has the school year gone? It seems like it was just September yesterday and now we are in our last month of the grade one school year. I have seen so much learning and growth over these last couple of months and am excited that students are gaining confidence and seeing themselves as learners. We still have lots to learn in June, which may be hard with the beautiful weather calling our names!

In Language Arts last month we learned about the Diphthongs au/aw, ou/ow, and oi/oy. Students practiced these and other sounds during our Literacy Centers. I have been enjoying the writing students have been doing in their journals. In June we will look at the Diphthong oo and the two sounds it makes. Then we will start to review all the sounds we have learned this year!

In Math we started our Measurement unit and explored bigger than/smaller than, longer than/shorter than, heavier than/lighter than, holds more/holds less, etc. All of these seemed to be very easy concepts for majority of the class! In June we will finish our last unit, Geometry, where we will focus on 2-D and 3-D shapes.



In Science we started Needs of Plants and Animals unit. We sorted living and non-living things and figured out how to classify living things. We planted beans and watched what happened. We also compared different seeds and how they grow by planting them in a clear glove that we hung in front of the window. An interesting extra lesson we got from that was why we need to wash our hands! We noticed lots of germs had grown along with our seeds!



As a class, we studied Hedgehogs. In June, we will pick our own animals and write a report about them. We will also conclude talking about seasonal changes in June.

In Social we will conclude our last unit, Changes in My World, where we will talk about how time has changed our families and community, from the past to what we see now. I am looking forward to our Cultural Celebration presentations where we link our family traditions to our past!

During Gym, we have been playing different variations of tag. Students have enjoyed playing different tag games so we will continue with new versions into June. We will also pull out the parachute and play some parachute games. The weather is so nice we may venture outside and try some of these games in the fresh air!

The classroom is getting hotter with this beautiful sunny weather, so please make sure to send a water bottle to school with your child. I will continue to send them home daily to be washed. If students are wearing sandals or flip flips to school, please also send in a pair of socks for their school shoes to keep them smelling fresh.




#### **3V June News**

#### **Language Arts**



## **Science**

#### **Social**

We are looking at how history has shaped Canada through immigration and the underground railway and the effects it has had on shaping Canada. We will be exploring the topics of WWI, the Great Depression, WWII, and economic booms and recessions.

#### **Student Transportation 2019-20**

Planning to use Student Transportation in the 2019-20 school year? If so, make sure your child is registered so Elk Island Public Schools (EIPS) can plan routes and send your child a bus pass before the first day of school. All students who indicated needing transportation services through the returning student registration process are now registered. Those families have also received tentative route schedules and invoices—all fees are due June 30, 2019.

Elk Island Public Schools is once again running Little Elk Island Adventure, a fun and informative program for first-time school bus riders.

Annually, Student Transportation offers the Little Elk Island Adventure to new riders and their parents. The program's aim is to help ease any anxieties a family may have about riding the bus before even starting school. Through a series of activities, riders learn about: school bus safety, danger zones, tips on boarding and how to sit properly on the bus. After that, both the children and parents hop on the bus to practice what they've learned and then venture out on a short ride.

#### **Access to Student User Accounts for Students Leaving EIPS**

If your child is graduating from or leaving EIPS at the end of the school year, they must ensure any information in their school accounts they wish to retain is downloaded onto a personal device or stored on a removable disk (for example, a USB key or portable hard drive) before leaving. Any files saved on their personal share drive (Z:) will need to be downloaded prior to the last day of classes on June 28. Any content in their Google accounts will need to be downloaded prior to September 1. Google files can be downloaded individually or in bulk with Google Takeout, *https://takeout.google.com*. All remaining information will be deleted and access to these accounts will be deactivated after these dates. For more information, contact the school at 780 796 3936.
