4. Trustee Report - Colleen Holowaychuk

\$6.1M in funding has been allocated to schools, we received 50% of the funding already and will receive the other 50% in January. We also had approximately \$2M remaining from last year.

\$2.9M has been given directly to the schools to be used in 3 main areas:

- 1. Learning gaps and achievement
- 2. Mental Health
- 3. Classroom Configuration

Oct 5-9 is "Read In Week,", celebrated annually. Resources are on the EIPS website to explore.

PATs and Diploma Exams will be written for LA & Mathematics. EIPS has decided to write PATs for in-school students and they are optional for out-of-school students. Diploma Exams are mandatory for both.

5. Principal Report - Cheryl Semeniuk

1. Friday was Custodian Appreciation Day. Thank you so much to Paulina and Ursula for all their hard work keeping the school clean and safe.

 Today is World Teachers' Day. Our teaching staff consistently demonstrate their passion for learning and teaching and dedication to making sure our students feel safe, cared for and progress academically. I am so proud of our teachers and grateful to get to work with them every day.

School Goal 3: Students will be better prepared for lifelong learning, the world of work and citizenship through enhanced parent engagement and community partnerships.

Division Outcomes:

6. Teacher's Report – Cheryl Barmentloo

Kindergarten has started their EYE-TA Assessments. It takes about a month and a half to complete assessments that focus on 3 major domains. These assessments tell staff if each child is at grade level, on watch, or at risk. These assessments test for learning readiness skills which help improve numeracy and literacy, such as: social skills, gross-motor skills, fine-motor skills, community awareness, etc. These assessments are great help when preparing the kiddos for grade one.

7. Town Report - Pat Lee

Regular Town Council Meetings are October 7 & 21. Organizational Meeting is October 14. For now, meetings are online on the Town website. Town Office will be closed on Monday, October 12 for Thanksgiving. Town is encouraging the use of masks in public places to help protect the community. Metro Kalyn Library is offering curbside pickup services. FCSS has a 'Community Awareness Newsletter' on the Lamont County Community Services website. Food Bank use numbers are starting to increase. October 15 is a Kickoff Meeting for Christmas Hampers. Town Budget Discussions have started for 2021. Council is looking at ways to encourage residents input in the decision process.
